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

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

The Health Corner

February is AMD awareness month; AMD is Age Related Macular Degeneration. Macular Degeneration is a leading cause of vision loss in Americans 50 and older. AMD is a gradual, progressive, painless deterioration of the macula; the macula is the small area in the center of the retina that gives us our detailed vision. The macula works by picking out fine detail. When this is damaged, the center of your vision becomes blurred and distorted. Over time, this can worsen, resulting in blank or white patches in your vision. Naturally, this makes activities such as recognizing faces, and reading much more difficult.

Some studies have shown that maintaining a healthy weight, eating a nutritious diet, smoking cessation and maintaining a normal blood pressure will help to prevent the worsening of the degeneration. Finally, it is very important to have your eyes examined no less than every two years.

SHIRLEY'S TOUCH OF HEAVEN

Shirley Squires is a friend to many people in the Brattleboro area and certainly is to many of us at Holton Home and Bradley House. She grew up in Guilford, married and raised 6 children and 2 foster children in Guilford, and now lives in the house where she spent much of her childhood. Shirley lost her husband Maynard, in December 1991, and her son Ron in January 1993. As a way of coping with these losses, in 1994 she started collecting nativities, which she has always liked and feels sum up the true meaning of Christmas. Shirley opened up her collection to the public in 1997, and has done so for just about every Christmas season since then.

The name "Shirley's Touch of Heaven" came around the time her son built an additional room, onto her garage, to help house the growing collection. Every year something gets added, much of it donated by family and friends.

On Thursday morning, January 11th, five of us from Bradley House made the trip to Guilford to see Shirley's magical and mind-boggling collection. She has over 1,400 sets of nativities from 55 different countries. That makes for many different interpretations of the nativity scene. There is much to marvel at in this collection from wood carved miniatures of the manger to depictions of the whole town of Bethlehem. Because of the religious nature of the subject you might not expect to find humor in this exhibit but it is there alongside the more serious pieces. I could wax on and on about this, but I should mention that Shirley is a wonderful host and loves to answer questions and explain about her collection.
